LEFTI Offers Emergency Relief To Flood Victims

In mid-April, heavy rains flooded numerous parts of the Lamuria area in Nyeri County, Kenya. Many homes throughout small villages were covered with mud and newly planted fields were washed away as the water surged through the streets.

The water showed no favoritism, as friend, Assistant Chief Rebecca, was one whose home was flooded. In addition, nearly 70 children had their only school shoes swept away in the torrent.

Nyeri County, with the assistance of the Red Cross, provided tents and some food. Some neighboring villagers opened their homes to some families. Life Empowerment for Transformation, Inc. (LEFTI), with Bernard Kabaru taking the lead, reached out to provide assistance, as well. Mattresses were provided to 44 families. Sixty-five children from 34 families received a pair of school shoes. The

Obedience Vs. Numbers

*Kieni West Women's Leadership Training Conference
Focused On Service And Joy In Obeying God*

On Saturday, April 29, the leaders of women's groups of the local churches within the Kieni West region met at Ruirii Church. The women shared prayer concerns and praised the Lord for "how He has seen them through."

While there was an expectation of 30-35 women to be at the meeting, only 14, including me, were able to attend, and those 14 represented only six of the churches. We set aside the original plan and decided to share the successes and challenges that each leader faces in her position as leader in her church, zone, or the association. These thoughts could be used for evaluation and planning for the future.

As we went around the circle, each woman expressed her challenges and the ways she has been encouraged in her tasks. Most had found renewed strength as she served in her position and felt revival in her own life.

Several reported the spiritual and numerical growth of men in their churches was taking place. The women's challenges revolved mostly around finances of their organization and a lack of commitment on the part of others to attend meetings.

As I listened, questions begin to form in my mind...How many meetings are there for women to attend each week at church or within the associa-

Growing With Faithful Confidence

Kieni West Pastors' Wives Gather For Training School

In April, it was time to return to Kenya to be with the eight pastors' wives of Kieni West who are studying to be more equipped to minister alongside their husbands among the churches in that area.

Because the pastors of this area serve multiple churches, the wives often find themselves speaking in one of the churches on any given Sunday. For this reason, they need to know how to be effective when given the opportunity.

The April training sessions were divided into three topics. "How to Prepare and Deliver a Sermon" was first in the series. Following the lectures, the women were assigned to take what they learned, apply it in preparing a sermon and then be ready to deliver it to the group. Because of limited time during the two-day training period, Anne, Beatrice and Jane presented their sermons, while the others provided copies to the others.

The second session took a more personal note in the form of *First Aid Training*. Oftentimes, getting professional medical help is impossible in the remote villages, so knowledge of how to perform basic first aid can literally save a life.

In this session, we discussed what the most common accidents are and then addressed them, accordingly. Key issues covered were burns, cuts, bleeding, broken bones, and choking, as well as how to apply first aid when accidents happen around the home and in the community.

The women were also made aware of the fact there is the equivalent of the United States 9-1-1 emergency call number for different areas in the region. Each woman was presented with a first aid kit for her home from Teleios Ministry. We had fun and laughs practicing the Heimlich maneuver on our favorite "dummy" – Floyd!

The third and final session covered *Personal Hygiene*. Personal

hygiene isn't just about being clean, but cleanliness combined with the intent to arrest the spread of communicable diseases.

In this session, we talked about acceptable and unacceptable hygiene practices. We covered bathing/showering, handwashing, hair and scalp health, oral hygiene, and keeping clothes clean.

Women have a unique position in being able to prevent the spread of disease. As caregivers to diapered infants and the aged, as well as those who prepare food for their families and friends keeping clean hands and homes is imperative. The women were given nail brushes as a gift to remind them of the importance of good hygiene practices.

Of course, we made time for some fun. During craft time, the women made pillows and fellowshiped.

The next session for the Pastors' Wives Training School will be in August.

 tion? What is the purpose of these meetings? What is the value in these meetings? Are too many meetings simply scheduled on the calendar but offering no substance that could make a difference in the lives of the women or their communities?

When all had finished sharing, the women asked if I had any advice or tips on how to meet the challenges they faced. It was then that I was able to ask the questions I had been contemplating as they shared.

We then discussed how they could deal with complacency from the other women about participation in meetings.

We talked about evaluating the need for so many meetings and how to plan meetings with purpose; meetings that

provide opportunities to learn more about God, to grow spiritually and to gather for the purpose of going out to minister and serve in the name of Jesus to those around them.

I posed two questions:

1. *“When you schedule a meeting, have you spent time with the Lord praying, planning and then carrying out preparations for the gathering?”*
2. *“Are you sure the meeting is of God; is it fulfilling His purposes?”*

If the answer is “yes” to these two questions, then the number of women who attend is irrelevant.

I explained that their intent demonstrates

their obedience in doing what God has called them to do, and the results are in His hands. Celebrate those who come and be assured that God spoke and directed those who are present.

Disappointment over attendance numbers robs leaders of the joy of serving. Joy and satisfaction are found in what is learned and, more importantly, in doing what God calls us to do.

I further noted that leadership is as much about being a good follower of Jesus as it is about leading the women from their area.

After a good meal, we all departed feeling affirmed in our calling and being encouraged by spending time sharing and growing together.

Water Projects, Partnerships Advance In Kenya

With a history that has roots in a 1987 effort to help residents find an alternative to trekking long distances in search of water for domestic use, the Gataragwa Water Project has taken many turns.

Over the years, undertakings by other communities to access pipelines connected to the Gataragwa Water intake have helped open opportunities for organizations, internal and external, to offer assistance in different ways. One of these entities is Life Empowerment for Transformation, Inc., (LEFTI).

As a result of involvement by LEFTI and others, resources of both financial, as well as professional expertise, have been used to construct a second source, the Gatogo Intake, and additional lines to provide for the soaring number of residents who want to be directly connected to water sources.

This phase covers four kilometers from the Aberdare Forest to Bellevue Town where a 225-meter cubed tank is being built to provide not only better access, but additional capacity beyond that currently available from the small tank that was constructed during the Colonial Era.

Partnering with LEFTI, two locations in the Birisha area have been identified, one for a water tank and one for borehole. Once in service, these will provide increased access to fresh, clean



water for people in that area. Still on the “to do” list is laying the pipelines for the Lamuria area.

Both the Barisha and Lamuria sub-locations are within the Kieni West Sub-County of Nyeri County where Teleios partners work.

Continue to pray for wisdom and guidance for partners as they delve through the balance of community and individual needs, government regulations and available resources. Pray, too, that in all things, God will be glorified and praised for how in His time and His way the gift of life-saving water was made possible through Living Water.

Second Tank To Bring Much-Needed Water

The second 60,000-gallon storage tank in Lamuria, Kenya, is under construction. As a point of reference, the tank is not far from Bernard and Mary Kabaru Mwangi’s house and the Birisha Church.

The first tank is already operating and has doubled water service to the area. The tank is part of a Gatarakwa Water District and Nyeri County plan to provide water for approximately 4,000 families in the Lamuria area.

The exciting part is that one year ago at a meeting of local leaders at Bernard and Mary’s house, the group stated that water was the greatest need. Tom Menefee, with Sunbelt Marketing, and Bill Kenny, with Kenny Pipe and Supply, were at the meeting and heard the need. Together with Life Empowerment for Transformation, Inc., (LEFTI), they joined in partnership with the local water district and county to help make this dream a reality.

The first tank was constructed and operational in less than nine months after that first meeting. The second tank is not far from completion. In fact, the work is on schedule and on budget.

Pray thanking God for His blessing in meeting this need and for continued guidance as water district officials work to keep the water flowing.

Reflections From the Green Chair....

Philippians 1:3-11 has been a focal passage guiding and understanding Teleios Ministry through its 18-year existence. In verse 6, the apostle Paul writes, *"God who began a good work in you."* God has started something in all of us in Jesus Christ. He is moving toward fulfilling His purpose in us.

Ephesians 2:10 outlines this good work that God has begun in us through Jesus Christ: *"For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we would walk in them."*

A friend of mine said, *"God is really working on me today."* The truth is God is working on all of His children every day. We are His workmanship – His handiwork (NIV) – God has shaped us and formed us into a useful vessel. We have sung for decades *"You are the potter, I am the clay..."* God has created us in Jesus Christ with purpose. The result, the purpose, being *"good works."*

God has been gracious to us and given us good works to do. He has prepared for each of us and for us as a community of faith good works to do. Our responsibility is not to create or develop good works. If we follow Jesus Christ, we will discover

the good works that God has prepared for us to do.

His expectation is that we will walk in them. They will be our life work. Just as we are His workmanship, so the good works are our life work. An outgrowth of our trust and faith in Him is *"the good works that He created us to do in Jesus Christ."*

God's Holy Word, the Scriptures, help us to recognize the good work and be prepared to do it. That is their purpose. The Scriptures equip us for good work – God's life operation manual. As I reflect upon my life, I realize how time is spent reading and trying to discover how to do God's way, God's purpose, God's will when the Scriptures are right before us. The Scriptures' purpose is to equip us for the good work. Then it hit me, maybe, the reason that I struggle in good work is because I have not invested enough in preparation through the Scriptures. (2 Timothy 3:16)

Let's face it, whatever we do we want it to be productive, we want to see the fruit, we want to see the positive result of our work. We want to know that our work made a difference. The Holy Spirit in us fills us with the knowledge of His will. We gain

wisdom and understanding as a result of this gift of the Holy Spirit. This produces fruit in every good work. We ask God to fill us with the knowledge of His will. We ask this gift from the Holy Spirit.

God promises and blesses us by providing whatever we need to do good work. He has the provision waiting as we go into the good work. (2 Corinthians 9:8)

My observation has been that God does not load us down with everything needed for the journey at the beginning. As we walk in the journey, we discover the provision along the way. We keep working, we keep walking, when something is needed, God has placed what we need right there. A warning is that God places it where we need it, not where we want it.

Good work requires trust. Good work requires a relationship with God through Jesus Christ. God begins good work in us. He gives us a great promise. We will finish it. We will complete the work. Our good work will not go undone or be incomplete. Our lives will end in fulfillment, completeness, wholeness. We will be Teleios.
