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# A Tent Full Of People Witness The Joy Of Baptism

I want to share in a few words of what God is doing here at this time. As I told you, the time arrived for Zozo's family to be baptized. While we prepared for the baptism, the idea came that we could do a few evangelistic meetings before baptism. The church agreed with that, and we started the preparation.

We prayed a lot, made invitations and invited the whole village. Because we didn't have baptism pool in the church building, we planned to do the baptism in the Mures river. The Foundation from the Gypsy mission that gave me the car to use offered us a big tent (300 people can sit under this tent), and a baptism pool we can use on the bank of the river.

People from two of the Gypsy missions came to help us in these evangelistic meetings and with the baptism. I invited my good friend Dohi Zoltan and a musician from Sarmasag named Miklos. So, last week we had two evangelistic meetings and had baptism on the third day.

God blessed us in a special way. Even though the weather was not too nice, almost every night the tent was full with people. We rented a bus and some people from Apalina came to hear the Gospel and to see Zozo's family baptized. I was very touched when I saw that more than 20 people

went forward to pray and to receive Jesus after the preaching. This was my first baptism service, and I will be happy if the others will be so blessed like this was.

A lot of people from the area came to the baptism service. My good friends pastor Totos Janos from Sangergiu de Padure, pastor Kelemen Sandor from Targu Mures, and pastor Doczi Gyorgy were also there. Doczi brought three women who were baptized at this time, too. So together there were eight people in white.

Since the baptism service more people are coming to Gornesti church, especially to the meetings at Zozo's house. Praise the Lord! Just yesterday, a young man came to me at Gornesti church and said that a few

### Reflections From the Green Chair.....

Over the past few years, I have heard a lot about living a balanced life. Something has always bothered me about "living a balanced life." A balance is a scale that has a focal point and objects of various weights are placed at different distances from the focal point depending on their weight in order that the scale will be balanced

What bothers me is that each time I hear about a balanced life, the elements or objects of one's life are treated as separate, unique entities of life. Usually Luke 2:52 is used, "Jesus increased in wisdom, statue, and in favor with God and man." The teaching on balance usually leaves it up to me to put everything in its proper place in order to live a balanced life. The truth is I spend a great deal of time trying to figure out how much "weight" or what is the proper "weight" for these areas of my life. You know, the routine of church, family, work, rest, etc.

As I sit reflecting, (now I must ask myself how much "weight" should be given to reflection verses family, ministry, etc.), I do not find the idea of balance in the Scriptures. It seems to me that Jesus said, "Seek first kingdom and

God will handle the rest."

The verse that really hits me is Matthew 5:48: "For you are to be perfect as your father in heaven is perfect." Actually, I translate that "For you are to be complete, whole as your Heavenly Father is complete."

The word used in that passage of Scripture is a very familiar one and one of my very favorite Greek words, Teleios. It means to be whole, to complete, or to accomplish what one sets out to do (to finish). I cannot see God trying to "balance" His existence. I do see God as whole and complete.

When I hear Luke 2:52, I do not think about four competing or distinct aspects of life but parts of a whole. Rather, I see parts that cannot be separated from one another. How can I separate favor with God from favor with man?

I have chosen to abandon a balanced life for an integrated life. I cannot separate business from church life, church life from rest, family from church life, or even family from business. We were not created to be balanced but to be complete or whole. I have chosen a different word, integrated. Everything in my life works together under the Lordship of Jesus Christ in order that I might be the person that He created and called me to be. I cannot separate one aspect of my life from another.

Paul wrote of the church—"many parts but one body..." In my attempt to balance my life, I, in fact, created separation in my life that God never intended. God created me and He recreated me in Jesus Christ to have an integrated life with everything working together. I now see Romans 8:28 with new eyes: "We know for those who love God He causes all things to work together for good to those who are called according to His purpose."

An integrated life allows me to focus on God in Jesus Christ following Him, confident that every thing in my life will work together for the best of life which is God's purpose. I am more concerned about living the full life that Jesus intended and letting him direct the way to a whole, complete life.
