To Love And To Serve ~ Work Continues In Seven Villages Area Of Romania

The Hope Group motto this year is "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the HOPE that you have..." – 1 Peter 3:15b

If we look around, we see that many people are losing hope because their hope was possibly built on their health, on good financial standing and material situation, or a good job.

So we, who truly have hope in Jesus, have to explore the economical crisis in order to give the answer to everyone who is asking us to give a reason for our hope. That is our purpose with the Hope Group and Sacele Mission Group for this year, to share the Gospel of hope in practical ways for the people who live in Seven Villages area.

Here is a summary of what we experienced with God last year here in the Seven Villages mission area.

Church Planting and Hope Group

We had regular meetings on Sunday evenings for the Sacele

Youth Club. We are glad that we have people who want to know Jesus Christ and come to our meetings regularly. There are about 12-15 people at the meeting. Some of them are dedicated to following Jesus and to serve and love, but some are not yet.



During this fellowship, we are singing and praying. We have poems, testimonies and Bible study. So, we are basically functioning as a small church, even if we belong to a different kind of denomination.

For me, it is a privilege to see how God started to change the lives of these people. Gyöngyi's baptism and testimony was an encouragement for them to go on and to not be ashamed to confess Jesus. They are committed to pray for those who are in



need because of sickness, family problems or social issues; to encourage each other and to help others.

Earlier, I wrote about the Hope Group's time at Hargita Camp where we were talking about special embassy task, what each committed Christian got

from God. Some of the Hope Group members started to formulate his/her own mission statement. Ildiko Jakab started to put in practice when she came home. Through her, two other dis-

abled ladies, Aranka and Norica, joined the Hope Group and Sacele Mission Group. She heard about them and Now they are new members in our group. Praise the Lord! Another older lady started to regularly visit our meeting. Her name is Eszti.



We had Christmas Party for the Sacele Children and their parents in December. On Dec. 24, we invited six ladies who live alone to come over. The reason was to make possible for those who are alone to spend Christmas evening with a family. We had Christmas supper together and fellowship. We all had a surprise when the youth from Brasov Church came to our home that night and were singing Christmas songs.

On Dec. 27, we had a special Christmas party for the Hope Group. For Norica it was first time to meet Hope Group. Pali was also thankful because test results were good and for three months he can remain home.

Serving and Helping in Sacele

We were able to help some poor families from Sacele with food and clothes, as well as financially.

It was a great joy for me to make it possible for a family to

have electricity in their home after four years. The father was a drinker, and in February last year, killed himself leaving two children, Arnold and Zsolti, and widow, Ibolya. Thanks to the generosity of a man from Ireland I met last summer, and with the help of



the Brasov Church, we were able to complete the reconnection process in time for the family to turn the lights on in their house just before Christmas! Please pray for this family to know the light of Jesus and accept Him in their lives.

The Purkerec Church

Last year, the Purkerec Church received a special blessing when Gyongyi joined this small church and confessed Jesus Christ as her Savior. Many times she gave thanks to God that she got a spiritual family from Him. I see this small church starting to understand that the Seven Villages Mission and Sacele Church Planting is their mission and they are beginning to contribute.

The Impact Of Economic Downturn On Teleios

Everyday and everywhere, we are reading about the impact of the economic situation on business, charities, and the home. I am asked almost daily about the impact upon Teleios Ministry and its partners.

For Teleios Ministry, we have seen two changes. The first change is the increase in support for individual projects - people are making specific investments in changing the lives of other people. The giving is more targeted than in the past.

The second change has been the decrease in general funds and administrative support. This administrative support is not personnel support or salary, but used for travel costs to meet with partners and develop new partnerships; provide emergency funds for ministries; or support partners when commitments are not fulfilled.

Let me say that the failure of commitments to be fulfilled is not a big issue—it happens. This week, general funds such as these were used to ship book bags to the Children's Home in Tanzania. Quality book bags could be purchased here and shipped to Tanzania at half the cost of buying them in Tanzania. Thus, a better quality product at a lower cost was provided. Also, some general funds were used to make up the difference in what was given and what was needed to purchase these book bags.

Another example is when general funds were used to provide for Adrian Giorgiov and Joseph Simon to go to Kenya this November. What a blessing for them!

Did you know that they represent Pro-Africa which was started

by Adrian after his 2007 visit to Kenya? Since Adrian's first visit the total amount represented by commitments from Romanian, Hungarian and European believers for support of work in Kenya has grown to over \$40,000!

Teleios Ministry did not receive anything financial as a part of helping to build this partnership. We invested in the development of the partnership using funds that you provided and relationships that we had established. Like the parable of the sower, the seed planted by Teleios Ministry resulted in a phenomenal harvest that continues to grow today.

One unexpected blessing has been the continued growth of support for global partners from outside the U.S. Teleios Ministry does not directly receive these funds. We assist in direct channeling of these funds. A recent example is the gift by a Hungarian couple to assist work in Kenya.

I want to take this opportunity to again make clear the financial policy of Teleios Ministry. First, 100 percent of a gift is used directly for the purpose it was given—no administrative fees are ever deducted. This week, I transferred funds for an irrigation pump for use in Kenya. The gift given was \$500. Our Kenya partners will receive \$500. No administrative fees, transfer fees (on either end) were – or will be – deducted.

I am confident that God provides for what He calls us to do and for who He calls us to be. The issue for us is never an economic one but a relational one. As Paul said, "My God shall supply all of your needs according to His richest in glory in Christ Jesus."

Teams Needed To Help Turn Visions Into Reality

You've read about the people and places. Now, you can not only see them but participate in hands-on projects that will turn God-given visions into present-day realities!

- In Kenya, efforts have begun to be able to offer two Bible Camps—one with our friends at Koinonia Church and one with Mary Kabaru at Happy Day Academy in Limuru.
- In Tanzania, growth and development at the Daily Bread Life Children's Home means basic construction and maintenance is becoming a necessity.
- An evangelistic team to help develop new church starts in the Iringa District of Tanzania is needed in August as reaching the un-churched and non-believers is a vision.

Prayerful Planting, Nurturing Of An Idea Yields Results Possible Only With God

"...I tell you the truth, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you"

It started as farm. It grew into two divisions of a farm—agricultural and hog. It expanded into a community water well project for the Kidetete area in the Iringa District. And now, it has the potential to advance to a secondary school for girls.

"It" is the original vision of turning a plot of land into a farm for the needed sustenance of vegetables for the Daily Bread Life Children's Home. And now, as a result of much prayer, deep faith and faithfulness, a mountain is on its way to being moved!

In less than a year, one piece of property has literally grown into nearly 10 acres suitable to sustain all the above-mentioned endeavors.

But the work is just beginning. The ground has been tilled and planting begun for the agricultural farm. Gifts from the Christmas Catalog have allowed for some fencing to be purchased, but additional support is needed for this priority item. The water well will be dug in March and plans will need to be in place for distribution methods and adequate irrigation for the farm. The opportunity to build a school for girls needs committed prayer

What follows is her experience that weekend.

Before flying to Romania I did not know what to expect.

The Parkers, Meg Hunt and I had spoken previously about Attila Toth's work and about the multitude of needs within his congregations in and near Reghin.

I didn't know what role I would play or what my "purpose" would be in visiting on that October weekend. I only thought to myself, 'I'm going to a wedding for someone I've never met, in a language I don't know, and in a place I have never been.' Since first hearing of Teleios' work in Romania, I have looked forward to seeing the work there in person, as well as trying to envision what God's mission would be for me in Romania, if, in fact, he wanted me to be there in February.

I was wholeheartedly welcomed by the wedding party on Saturday. I often recall the big smile Lala's father had whenever I saw him. Each time he greeted us, it was like seeing an old friend. No one seemed to ask, "Who is this strange, new person?" It was natural to them for me to join in celebrating the wedding of Lala and Ester.

The wedding moved me in such an unexpected way. I had been to weddings of Wofford classmates over the summer, but this wedding was somehow different. I emotionally watched as Ester's family "gave her away." The joyful emotion that the families felt, I, too, was experiencing. I was reminded that this bride and groom were also my family. Though I had not known them until that day, we were part of the same family, and I could cry, applaud, laugh and celebrate this wedding along with their friends and family.

Visiting the Gypsy slum was also an important part of my weekend. I didn't know how to prepare to face the level of poverty people just like me would be living in. But even in this place, I was welcomed into homes and greeted warmly by the children and adults whom Attila ministers. I know that Attila's work with the Gypsies could be considered never-ending, but the list of challenges didn't seem daunting or impossible because of his faith that all would work according to God's plan.

The other time over the weekend when unexpected emotions rose within me were when I attended the church service in Filipsu Mic. I had to leave in the middle of our worship time to go to the airport. It was sad in one way for me to leave. On that day, I had been in Europe for just over a week. As I went to leave, they told me they would pray for me as I find a church in Salzburg. I was surprised by their compassion for me, a person they barely knew. Yet so quickly they thought to pray for my need. It was nourishing to spend time with these believers before returning to my new (but still a bit foreign) home in Austria. My hope of returning to Romania was strengthened by their love and faith.

Reflections From the Green Chair.....

My life has been captured by this simple but profound statement, "Jesus Changes Lives." I am convinced that the purpose of the local church, the believer in the marketplace, and any community of faith is to change lives in Jesus Christ.

Jesus' purpose was to change lives. The purpose of the church is to change lives. The purpose of the individual Christian is to change lives. No matter what else we may do as followers, our focus, mission and purpose is to change lives.

Every time Jesus spoke of why He came and/or of what He sought to accomplish, He spoke of transformation and changing of life. If you want to know why you are here, you and I exist to change lives of others in Jesus Christ.

The story of Bartimeaus in Luke 18:35-43 reveals the results of a changed life and the absence of mission of changed life.

Bartimeaus means son of honor (Mark 10:46-52). Bartimeaus was a blind, beggar on the side of the road just outside of Jericho. Some people gave to him, but most just passed by without even noticing him. Jesus was going to Jerusalem to be crucified and raised from the dead.

Bartimeaus was blind not deaf—he heard

Jesus was coming. He began to cry out, "Son of David, have mercy on me." Those who were close to him and in the group traveling with Jesus told him to be quiet, but Bartimeaus was not going to let this opportunity pass him by. He became louder and louder. The followers with Jesus were just as adamant that he not disturb Jesus.

With all on his mind, Jesus heard Bartimeaus cry. He commanded the silencers to bring Bartimeaus to him. Jesus asked Bartimeaus a unique question, "What do you want me to do for you?" You would think Jesus knew he was blind, but Bartimeaus said, "I want to see again."

Jesus said, "Because of your faith, you are healed." Bartimeaus went out and began to praise God. In fact, he was continually praising God. But the passage also says, "He followed Jesus." More than a healing of the eyes, this was a call to follow. Bartimeaus now followed Jesus.

The most amazing thing about this story is what happened next. Bartimeaus' praising and healing caused the very ones who had passed him by, who told him to be quiet, who stood between him and Jesus to begin praising God. Because Bartimeaus would not be silent, those

who sought to silence him now joined him in praise.

Jesus changes lives. When we praise God for our changed life, others join us. If we are silent, the rocks will cry out.

Jesus is never too preoccupied to change lives. Sometimes, however, those closest to Jesus stand in the way of life change. When we praise Him, others join in.

Listen, if we complain, they join our complaints. We exist to change lives, and I believe it's for every aspect of life. Jesus changes a life with more than a spiritual transformation. The transformation is manifested in external change.

This newsletter is filled with stories of transformation. Our lives are to be examples and instruments of transformation of the whole person. Yes, it begins on the inside, but transformation flows outward in real life and community change.

The living water of Jesus brings clean water to drink. The bread of life of Jesus brings the maize to eat. Orphans become family. The displaced have an eternal and local home. Jesus changes lives.
