The trip to Africa in December and January had many facets. Team members came and went as needed for the various aspects of the work being carried out over the last days of December and during the month of January...15 Americans and four Kenyans in all.

From conducting Holiday Bible Camp during December for children and youth in Kenya, through the days of construction work in Tanzania, and until the closing days leading a conference for pastors, their wives and other church leaders, the team members never stopped!

First Stop – Gatunguru

As quickly as we could get the Christmas tree down and the luggage

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and supplies loaded, Floyd, Victoria Horne and I rushed to the airport to fly to Kenya!

Though we didn't actually leave until Dec. 27, it seemed like it was literally right after Christmas dinner. We arrived in Nairobi on the evening of Dec. 28 and waited briefly for the arrival of Kristi Glenn, the fourth member of our team. Kristi, of Leesburg, Virginia, had been in Tanzania at Daily Bread Life Children's Home teaching English to the children since Dec. 3. Her trip would be drawing to a close as ours was just beginning.

From the airport, we went directly to the Blue Post Hotel in Thika. It would serve as our home base for the next week and a half while we conducted the Holiday Bible Camp for churches in the Gatunguru area.

Bernard Mwangi, his daughters, Shirley and Carole, and Linda Rungu from Koinania Church rounded out this team. Each morning we left the hotel and traveled to the church. Leaders representing eight area churches participated with us in order to learn how to conduct next year's camp on their own.

This year's Bible Camp theme was *"Loving Our Neighbors of the World As Jesus Loves."* Neighbors were defined from the story of The Good Samaritan. Bible stories taught were of early believers sharing God's redeeming love to people whose culture or ethnicity was different from their own. The academic component focused on geography. Recreation and crafts completed the schedule. We averaged 167 children for the week. Many of the older children repented and committed their lives to Jesus Christ during the week.



Visual aids helped the children learn the daily Bible stories and understand how they represented this year's theme of loving your neighbor as Jesus loves.



For more than a year, members of this widows support group have found strength and encouragement in being able to pray for each other, as well as share stories and resources.

One afternoon after camp activities concluded, Bernard, Floyd, and I met with a widows' support group. Formed last year, this group meets on a monthly basis. We listened as they shared their stories and the struggles of widowhood. Due to tribal customs regarding land rights, which often conflict with modern laws of inheritance, the women find themselves under physical and/or legal attack from relatives of their late husbands. They have found encouragement and strength as they pray together and share resources when needs occur within the group.

A Visit to Nyeri, Rest at Sweetwaters and Future Planning

Bernard's wife, Mary, joined us for the last couple of days of camp. After the week of camp, we went to the Nyeri region. Bernard and Mary are originally from this area. We had a delightful visit with Bernard's mom. As always, we were served a delicious meal.



We then traveled to Sweetwaters Safari Camp for a brief rest. Spending two days among the African wildlife at the base of Mt. Kenya and relaxing with our friends was truly a blessing.

After this respite, we said good-bye to Kristi as she departed for home. We, too, left and headed to the new land purchased last year. Time was spent walking the land, discussing the future and the timetable for development of Bernard's vision. Together, we joined hands and prayed with thanksgiving and for wisdom and guidance for the development.

We are grateful to God and our supporters that the afterschool program is in year three.



Four qualified teachers are currently working with us as our program now reaches 30 students! This growth is due in part to the completion of the second-floor construction at the church which allows us to teach the children in small groups on the basis of their classes at school.

We have identified three goals for this academic year:

1. Motivating the children to attend regularly.
2. Encouraging parents to get involved.
3. Helping the children develop a strong character.

We ask for your continued prayers and support as we work together with the young people and their parents in these efforts.

KENYAN BLESSINGS

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Traveling back to the outlying area of Nairobi, we spent the night at the Kentmere. Over the years, it is a place that has been like a home away from home when in Kenya. By mid-afternoon the following day, we were flying off to Tanzania.

Welcome To Tanzania

Arriving in Dar es Salaam by nightfall, we settled into the Transit Hotel until 5 a.m. when we caught our flight to Iringa for a new facet of our trip.

By 8:30 that morning, we were greeted at the Iringa airport by Neema and Mpeli Mwaisumbe. We had last-minute preparations to take care of before other team members arrived. For a day and a half we planned and spent time with the children of DBLCH.



On Jan. 10, Floyd, Mpeli and Victoria drove to Dar. Victoria was catching her return flight to South Carolina to start her final semester at North Greenville University, while 10 new team members from Eastern Industrial Supply, Inc., (EISI) in Greenville, flew in to do work at the Daily Bread Children's Home.

On the EISI team were Kip and Kim Miller, Rudy Diaz and Chris Judkins from the Greenville Branch; Trey Stapleton from the Spartanburg Branch; Leslie Jones from the Charleston Branch; George Alford from the Florence Branch; and Matt Guile, the Jacksonville, Florida, Branch, and Eastern Cares Champion Tony Johnson and his son, Joe, also from Jacksonville.

EISI is the Teleios Ministry partner for DBLCH. This was the third annual company trip and is the largest to date. Because of the large number of participants and the limited number of vehicles, Kip, Kim and Leslie flew to Iringa. The rest of the team experienced the wonderful 10-hour inland driving adventure chauffeured by Mpeli and Floyd!

The team was welcomed by the children with singing and dancing on Saturday afternoon.



Banners with greetings covered the courtyard of the compound. Sunday was a full day of worshipping at both Kidete and ACTS Fellowship TZ.

That night, the children gave Kim a birthday party! We celebrated with pizza and a cake. Everyone was excited and ready for the great week of work that lay ahead.

Replacement Windows, Sidewalk, Bookshelves and a Whole Lot of Fun

The next eight days were filled with lots of work, laughter and love. The team removed all of the old dormitory windows in record time. The project, scheduled for several days, took less than half a day!

It was dirty and labor-intensive, but the team worked together beautifully. The children wanted to be a part of what was happening, so after some instruction, many of them jumped in and helped.



On day two, we began laying a walkway within the compound of the Children's Home. From designing the walkway, leveling the land, moving the paving stones and sand, then laying them and filling in with sand provided a job for everyone - old and young alike. It was truly a team effort! It took two full days to get the stones down. While work on the walk continued, other members constructed shelves for the dorm rooms.



Playing with the children and just spending time talking with them was a constant throughout the week. This helped the children practice their conversational English. They had learned so much under Kristi's teaching and gained more and more confidence as they used what they had learned.

A new school year for Tanzanian students began during our visit.

Throughout the week the children were heading off in different directions to various schools. The primary school students attend several different schools in the area. The secondary school students at the present time are divided - some are in boarding schools, while others attend local day schools. Ten are now in the inaugural class of our new Bread of Life Secondary School. And yes, four of the orphans left for their first year of college!

Every evening the team enjoyed dinner with Neema and Mpeli's household. It was a time of good fellowship as we got to know the family, as well as each other, a little better.



On Thursday morning, we traveled to the Asante Sana Children's Home in Nzihi for breakfast. We were welcomed by the children and staff. After touring the facility, sharing and praying together, we ate.

Members of the EISI team left Nzihi for the Mwaguse Safari Camp in Ruaha National Park for an overnight safari adventure. It was a wonderful safari! Spending the night along with an afternoon and morning game drive gave the team an opportunity to enjoy God's creation.

While the team was on safari, Floyd, Kip and Mpeli met with the regional mayor at his office. He had been very helpful in navigating the necessary steps to acquire permission to build and register the new Bread of Life Secondary School, the latest phase of Daily Bread Life Ministry.



The Millers, the Parkers and the Mwaisumbes spent most of Friday reflecting on the developments of DBLCH and discussing the future together. There was much praise and thanksgiving for what has been accomplished under the Lord's leadership over the years. We dreamed and prayed about what God would have us do as partners with Him and one another in the years to come.

When the team returned from safari late Friday afternoon, we all went shopping at the market for souvenirs. There was a whole lot of "wheeling and dealing" and bargaining going on! The local economy certainly received a boost.

For the EISI team members Saturday was a day spent playing games with the children and packing for home. It was a day of mixed emotions. While ready to return home to family, friends and work in various locations, the team knew they would miss the children's presence and would leave bits of their hearts on the soil of Tanzania!



Bernard Mwangi, our Kenyan partner, flew in on Saturday morning during a massive thunderstorm as sheets of rain poured down! Yes, the rainy season of the Southern Highlands of Tanzania had begun. Bernard had come to Tanzania to participate in a conference in Tukuyu...the last major facet to the January trip.

On Sunday morning, the pilot of the departing flight called asking if the team would come to the airport as soon as possible. Severe thunderstorms were predicted for the area by mid-morning and he wanted to be out of Iringa before they arrived. So after a quick breakfast and a time of worship, the team loaded the bus for the Iringa airport.

Neema, Bernard, Pawdre Scout, Stephen and I went along to see them off. Floyd and Mpeli accompanied the team to Dar. The small plane was literally full and reached maximum weight capacity! It took a while to get the luggage situated in the plane, but as clouds gathered on the horizon, the little plane lifted off heading for Dar.

Since the team's flight to the U.S. would not leave until midnight, there was some time to explore. EISI team member, Tony, had worked in Dar for Campus Crusade for Christ (CRU). His son, Joe, had been born there 20 years earlier. Tony wanted Joe to see the hospital and the location of his family's home during that time. So a friend of Mpeli's took them on that mini-tour. The others went off to see the Indian Ocean and to an air-conditioned mall for the rest of the afternoon.

Before going to the airport, the team went to the Namnani Hotel where Floyd and Mpeli would be spending the night. They were able to each get quick showers before checking in at the airport and boarding the flight for home.

Off to Mbeya, The Conference in Tukuyu and A Visit to Our New Tribe

Neema, Bernard and I set off on the four-and-a-half hour drive to the Mbeya District, while Floyd and Mpeli flew from Dar and joined us. While there, we visited Chris and Agrey who are now freshmen at a college in Mbeya District. It was great to see them happy and adjusting to college life and being away from DBLCH.

Early the next morning, we drove to Kibisi Baptist Church in Tukuyu to begin the conference. Church leaders of all denominations from the surrounding area had been invited by the Reverend Harry Mwasanjala, pastor emeritus and former president of Tanzanian Baptists, to participate in a Leadership Development Conference which we had been asked to lead.

Baptists, Lutherans and Pentecostals all participated in the three-day event. It was a great time of worship as local choirs led in singing and dancing interspersed throughout the teaching sessions.

During the closing session, we were presented with gifts used by the tribal forefathers and even by the farmers today... a spear for protection and defense, as well as a farming tool that is the combination of an axe and pick.

Harry is a chief of the Nyakusa and last year he adopted me as a daughter into his family. When Floyd visited in November, Harry made it legal by registering a plot on his land for our home among his people. While we were there, we walked the land and discussed when would be the best time to begin developing the land in accordance with the vision of the mission. Our hearts were full as we made our way back to Mbeya. God has blessed us so by giving us a worldwide family!

New Work Coming Together

Neema and I went to Ilono on Friday morning to look at the new pre-school that Teleios partners had helped to become a reality.

Monica and the women's group of her church had a vision to begin a pre-school. Last year, work had come to a standstill due to illness in their group. I prayed with them on the property and felt led to share their story upon my return home. Teleios partners responded and the women were able to complete the building!

Thirteen children are now learning in that place. The women continue to work in order to add "luxuries" to the facility...things like a toilet and windows! Please remember them in your prayers as they journey on following their God-given dream.

Mpeli had set aside Friday for us to have prayer time for Bread of Life Secondary School and the commissioning of Pawdre Scout as headmaster. Mpeli and Neema's fathers, as well as a local pastor, joined us. They had mentored Pawdre as a young man and been instrumental in helping him acquire his education.

It was an emotional time as we discussed the work we've done together over the years and as we looked to the future each sharing his/her hopes and dreams. Prayers of thanksgiving and praise were offered, specifically for wisdom and guidance as we move ahead the Secondary School.



The Holy Spirit was moving in that place. It was a very powerful moment when Pawdre Scout knelt and we laid hands on him praying for him, setting him apart for the task to which God has called him as headmaster of the school.

Saturday – Journey's End

Our work was complete for this trip. We had witnessed the power of God in so many ways throughout the month-long journey. Thank you for your continued prayers and support in helping turn God-given visions into present-day realities across the globe.

Reflections From the Green Chair.....

In truth, I have to tell you that this column was not written from the Green Chair but a hotel desk chair. So far in 2014, I have spent more time away from home and the Green Chair than at home – 30 out of 50 nights to be exact. Forty years ago, 20 years ago, 15 years ago, I never thought that would be my life.

I was asked the question, “Where did you get your mission focus?” The person who asked is a great friend who meant it as compared with the other emphases of the church. My response was so much simpler and quicker than I thought that it even surprised me. Honestly, I must have been working on the answer to this question in my mind for some time. My response was “I believe that church exists for mission. Mission is the only reason the church exists. Mission is the only reason for me to exist.” I realized that everything we do points to one thing – the fulfillment of the mission.

Jesus said, “As you go, make disciples of all nations baptizing...teaching them to obey...”

Jesus said, “As the Father sent me, so I am sending you.”

Jesus said, “Love one another as I have loved you.” (Check out what love means from a New Testament/Jesus definition).

These passages are about more than evangelizing the lost. They are about transforming all of human life, even all of God’s creation, with the power of the Gospel.

We do not do missions; we are on mission. We do not go on a mission trip; we go on mission. I look back on my life and realize how God through His Word, His Spirit, and His People has been moving me along on mission.

Forty years ago in January, 1974, I walked down the aisle of Marion Baptist Church in Marion, S.C., and told Dr. Paul Batson, Jr., that I had committed my life to “fulltime Christian service,” to be a pastor or leader of God’s people.

Twenty years ago in January, 1994, Bonnie and I stepped foot on Kenyan soil as part of a mission partnership. This was the first time I had ever been called to go to another country (on a mission trip). Out of that experience, the vision of Teleios Ministry was born.

Fifteen years ago in February, 1999, I was diagnosed with a heart blockage that had to be fixed. I remember so well Acts 20:24 as I prayed the night before the procedure. I prayed, “Oh, Lord, my life matters nothing to me, I ask you to let me finish what you put me on this earth to do.” By the way, Teleios is a Greek word that means to finish, to complete, to fulfill.

Why am I saying this? Because, I cannot imagine life not focused on the Mission of Our God. I cannot imagine life not focused on following Our Lord Jesus Christ on Mission. As a young man, I sang with the congregation of God’s People with great enthusiasm, “Wherever He leads, I’ll go; I’ll follow my Christ who loves me so; wherever He leads, I’ll go.” Now, I realize it is one thing to sing, to say, or to pray it, but the most important thing, the only thing, is to live it, to focus on it.

You know my Christ led me to this hotel room and this office chair. Where has He led you? Life is all about the Mission.
