His life is extremely busy as he pastors the Reghim church – a very small, older church in need of revitalization, works among the Gypsies of Apalina to establish a mission, leads the young church at Gornesti he helped found, and ministers in a growing house fellowship in Peris. We could hardly keep up with him during our stay!

Simple, Yet Effective Ministry Grows From Diversity

Otto, Elisabeth Kis Find Many Opportunities To Share God's Love in Seven Villages Area Of Romania

After being with Otto and Elisabeth Kis for five days in October, we gained new insight into the diversity and yet simplicity of their ministry in the Seven Villages area of Romania.

During our brief stay, Bonnie led the regular women's meeting on Thursday night while Otto, 4-year-old Benjamin, 2-year-old Rhode and I went to a disabled lady's house and picked her apples for her.

On Friday, the Hope Group was invited to the Kis house for a meeting of prayer, singing, and sharing. The Hope Group is comprised of people who have been designated as disabled by the government. But, their love for each other, their deep desire for following Jesus Christ, and their

commitment to reach the Seven Villages with the Gospel reveals that "disability" is not descriptive of their hearts.

One of the group, Ildiko, was going to have hip replacement surgery (She has since had the surgery and doing well). This group and others took up a collection for her and presented it to her. I could not believe that this group raised over \$800 for her.

The group lifted her up in prayer and wept as they placed her in the Lord's hands and expressed their love for her. We shared a delicious meal prepared by Elisabeth with Bonnie's assistance. Usually, Elisabeth does it all by herself. The Hope Group meeting lasted until 4 p.m.

We enjoyed a wonderful meal and time of visiting with Marta, David, and Peter. Their home has been our home for over seven years. Gornesti Church Warm In Spirit, But Building In Need Of Heat

The Gornesti church provided Bonnie and me with two unique experiences. First, we visited in the home of Zozo whose baptism was featured in the July newsletter. You will remember that his mother, father, grandmother, and sister committed their lives to follow Jesus Christ at his baptism. We had a wonderful time worshipping the Lord and celebrating their new life in Jesus Christ.

One of Zozo's brothers, Istvan, has made a decision to follow Jesus and the other brother, Lala, has heard the Gospel and is very close to a decision to follow the Lord. Please pray for this family as they seek to serve the Lord. Zozo also asks for our prayers as he leads the family in a morning and evening time of Scripture reading and prayer.

Second, we worshipped on Sunday afternoon, October 21, with the Gornesti church in their newly completed church building. The weather was very cold. The church does not have a heating system. The temperature was 37 degrees F inside the church when the worship service began.

During the service, the power went off. No lights or the two small electric heaters being used were on. Without these, the temperature began to drop, but the worship was warm and alive with the Spirit of God.

As winter approaches, the group is meeting in a small back room of the church building using two small borrowed electric heaters. Teleios Ministry is seeking partners to assist with providing two radiators and the natural gas hookup for the church so they can have heat. The cost of this project will be \$2,000.

The brothers had been abandoned by

their mother and their father was in prison. All their uncles are in prison. The oldest said, "If I do not change, I will be in prison. I do not want this kind of life. I am tired of the fighting." By this time, tears were in his eyes. Attila briefly went over what Bonnie and Floyd had said earlier.

The two boys bowed their heads and began to pray. Their confession of sin was very simple and straightforward, naming sin after sin. The brothers were so excited to begin their new life in Jesus Christ.

Interspersed between the morning and afternoon teaching sessions were testimonies from the Gypsy women, skits and Bible readings. Many of the women have learned to read using the Bible. It is amazing to see how many own a Bible now and are able to find Scripture references and read them!

The teaching sessions, led by myself and

Eboya Balint, president of Hungarian Baptist Woman of Romania, focused on spiritual growth.

A committee from the Satu Mare church prepared a delicious mid-day meal. It was delivered to Acas and served under a warm sun and brilliant blue sky in the courtyard of the church. Lunch time provided for a great time of reunion and fellowship. Seeing food, many little children from the surrounding area joined us for the lunch hour! There was plenty of food to share and this time gave an opportunity to talk to the children about the love of Jesus.

That afternoon, the conference concluded with a worship time. The entire community had been invited for this. Dr. Floyd Parker, translated by Zoltan Vekas, pastor of the Satu Mare church, preached an evangelistic message. Fifteen people responded to the call of the Lord on their life.





As the day ended, we drove back to Satu Mare tired but filled with thanksgiving to God for allowing us to participate with Him in His work among the Roma women.

Barnabas Group Represents New Generation Of Pastors

Twenty young Hungarian Baptist pastors from across Transylvania came together to learn, grow, fellowship, and be challenged in their work with Christ. Known as the Barnabas Group, these young men all graduated from the Hungarian Baptist Seminary Romania after the fall of communism in Romania.

Istvan Gergely, President of the Hungarian Baptist Convention of Romania (HBCR), and Jozsef Kovacs, General Secretary of the HBCR and former dean of the seminary, have a dream of providing ongoing growth opportunities for these pastors. These two men also serve as the facilitators of the group.

The group meets twice a year as a large group and once a month in smaller groups for encouragement, learning, and practical support. Twice a year, Teleios Ministry assists the group in bringing



spiritual leadership conference facilitators to meet and lead the group in areas of leadership growth.

This was the first large meeting of the group since their initial organization in the spring of 2007. I led the group in teamwork exercises, discovery and practical application of leadership styles, and current and future trends/challenges in the church globally and Biblical practices

to respond positively to these challenges locally.

The Barnabas group is also serving as a pilot group for a three-year spiritual leadership development interactive process.

The time spent on October 9-10 was an exciting beginning of a new day in the continuing growth of this new generation of pastoral leaders. You were a part of this opportunity through the General Funds of Teleios Ministry.

In March and October 2008, speakers/facilitators are needed for the semiannual meetings. This will require leading approximately six hours of lecture and practical learning experiences for the group. Also, there will be the opportunity to work with the young pastors in their churches and experience first-hand the impact of the Barnabas Group.

ference on Nov. 28 - Dec. 1.



Reflections From the Green Chair.....

On Sunday, I thought I heard my niece, Abigail, say, "We're trying to skip Thanksgiving and just go on to Christmas." Whatever happened to Thanksgiving? What has happened to thanksgiving in the lives of believers?

The truth is that thanksgiving usually gets squeezed out in our desire to accomplish so much in our busy lives or circumstances that we see as trouble-some or suffering. We move from one thing to another so fast that we forget thanksgiving. Who has time to be thankful.

What about what is happening in our lives? Who feels like being thankful. Yet, thankfulness is at the very heart of the Christian faith. I must confess as I reflect. I must repent as I reflect. I have let the pride of busyness rob me of the joy of thanksgiving and the blessing of thanksgiving for God's people.

Paul wrote to the church at Thessalonica: "My friends, even though we have a lot of trouble and suffering, your faith makes us feel better about you. Your strong faith in the Lord is like a breath of new life. How can we possibly thank God enough for all the happiness you have brought us? Day and night we sin-

cerely pray that we will see you again and help you to have an even stronger faith. We pray that God our Father and our Lord Jesus will let us visit you. May the Lord make your love for each other and for everyone else grow by leaps and bounds. That's how our love for you has grown. And when our Lord comes with all of his people, I pray that he will make your hearts pure and innocent in the sight of God the Father." - 1 Thessalonians 3:7-13 (Contemporary English Version)

Now read Paul's follow-up letter to the church at Thessalonica: "Our God gives you everything you need, makes you everything you're to be. You need to know, friends, that thanking God over and over for you is not only a pleasure; it's a must. We have to do it. Your faith is growing phenomenally; your love for each other is developing wonderfully. Why, it's only right that we give thanks. We're so proud of you; you're so steady and determined in your faith despite all the hard times that have come down on vou. We tell everyone we meet in the churches all about you." - 2 Thessalonians 1:2-4 (The Message)

Do you see that in both the circum-

stances are described as "trouble and suffering." First Paul and then the church were experiencing difficult times. Out of his thanksgiving for the church, he prayed for their love and faith to grow. Then, in the second letter, he offers thanksgiving to God for the growth of their faith and love. This growth gave Paul encouragement and joy in difficult circumstances.

Christmas Catalog Now

I pray that thanksgiving will be the gift you receive and give this Christmas. Thanksgiving changes our perspective and our prayers. When was the last time that you thanked God for the joy/the happiness that other believers bring into your life?

When was the last time that you were thankful because of how proud you were of another Believer or church. My prayer is that thanksgiving will be the gift we offer again and again to God this Christmas season—not for ourselves but for our brothers and sisters in Christ who encourage us, strengthen us, and bless us with their example of a growing faith and love in Jesus Christ.
