People from my churches (Reghin, Filpisu Mic, Peris, Gornesti and Apalina) were there, too. From Apalina, we went with 40 people, so the two minibuses were very full. It was a great joy for these people to be there. Thank you very much for your help, for the renting the minibuses. We appreciated that very much. God bless you for that.

A great thing happened after the baptism service. Three people from Apalina, who just became Christians in December, were asked to give their testimony. They never talked before so many people, but their testimony was very good, and Continued on page 4

Indigenous Partnerships Rely On Relational Experiences

Awareness, Investment And Involvement Combine To Create Effective Change

Writing used to be fun, and easy, back when I merely parroted the concepts of others to translate them into coherent presentations. Now, when forced to actually think and wrench meaning from my own, personal, God-provided experience, I shrink from the keyboard.

However, Dr. Floyd Parker has informed me that I indeed must write, and the experience is far too fresh, and far too meaningful to my understanding than to allow me

escape from its address here.

I landed in Nairobi on our January trip expecting the drama of poverty, helplessness, and despair; simpler problems I likely could impact in some meaningful way.

What I experienced was life fighting poverty and uncertainty with courage, determination, creativity, and hope. The issues were far more complex than my understanding, relying far more upon the wisdom of the indigenous leadership than upon any intervention I may propose.

After a whirlwind experience, being led by able guides, such as Bernard Kabaru Mwangi and Frank Mwaisumbe, and hosted by many generous friends I discovered that:

- My nose has smelled the scents of a pre-sanitized world. I experienced the smells of older methods, danger, and illness, but also the sweet scent of celebration and worship that I had also forgotten.
- My ears, although older now, and less able to hear human voices, have learned better to be sensitive to God's voice and the individual voices of His children.

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Whether taking an interactive tour of different facilities or meeting with pastors before the conference begins, the key to helping turn God-given visions into reality is relationships.

RELATIONAL EXPERIENCES

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- My eyes, although growing weaker each day, have learned to more clearly see God at work in the world around me.
- My tastes, muted by years of plenty have experienced again the sensation of God's goodness and creative diversity.
- My sense of touch most of all, numbed by years of trying not to feel too much, has learned the pain of feeling the bones beneath a weakened child's skin, and has learned anew to feel the whisper of God in the brief, gentle mountain breeze.

Yes, I looked for the drama of the exotic, the new experience, but what I found was the everyday drama of life. I've heard it said that the only way to understand your own culture is to be immersed in another, and I believe I am proof of that rule. For I have gained much more than I could possibly have imparted.

I find that I am more alive, more free, more grateful, and more self-reliant than when I arrived. I also find that I am more determined.

You see, it is fun to watch challenging, new ventures, and even fun to write a small check and claim participation. The real investment – the cost of admission to the life offered by Christ in the market-places of our world though – is investment of human capital. During the trip, I came to realize that the need was greater for genuine partnership than any other re-

source. Surprisingly, I learned that my need for the gifts received from those partners was likely more significant than any need which I might address on their behalf.

To say that I was humbled would be accurate, but it would also be a gross mischaracterization of the experience. Although, admittedly, there was a component of arrogance, ignorance was actually the greater issue. My pre-trip ignorance simply did not allow for the depth and breadth and beauty of human experience and intellect and creativity and love that I encountered.

Gratefully, I am the product of a family that lived out of God's grace, led me to

Christ by the wonder of His loving forgiveness, and continues to lead me to understanding through that lens. My understanding of my condition is therefore that I am simply forgiven, and have the opportunity to grow from my ignorance toward new life and understanding.

As Frank explained to me in Tanzania, "Hope is prayer, and prayer is constant – we should always be thinking, hoping for the best for each other every day, all day." It is that partnership my new African friends need if their God-given visions are to be realized. It is that partnership I need if my own God-given visions are to be realized.

There are many new, exciting opportunities to participate in the work in East Africa. We were able to observe and briefly discuss several specific initiatives that will be further researched and developed as we prepare for what God will do in coming weeks and months. I am excited about the opportunities that we will have to join Kenyan and Tanzanian partners in hoping, praying, and following God-given visions to their completion together.

I also am grateful for the opportunity I have had to see and experience the beauty of East Africa and her people. I am even more grateful for the way that God has opened my nose, my eyes, my other senses to see his vast creation, and to enlarge my understanding of the Body, His Church, in this world.

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Reflections From the Green Chair.....

Every now and then, a story from the Bible captures my attention and I cannot get away from it.

Often, it is one of those strange or difficult stories. In preparing for a Bible study on David, I also read the life of King Saul, the first king of Israel. One story really stands out and has spoken to me.

In 1 Samuel 13:5-15, King Saul has assembled the army of Israel because of a threat from the Philistines. The Philistine army is large, well-equipped, and seeking revenge. The army of Israel and Saul are waiting for the prophet Samuel to come and lead them in a prebattle/war worship through sacrificial offering.

From Saul's perspective, Samuel is late in coming. Each day that he waits on Samuel, the level of fear among the soldiers increases and defections from the army increase.

Saul is hard-pressed now with issues of morale and desertion in the army. He knows something must be done.

He cannot stand the pressure any longer and takes matters into his own hands. He offers the sacrifices himself in violation of God's law.

Just as he finishes making the sacrifices, Samuel arrives and says to Saul, "What have you done?" Saul replies, "Now the Philistines will come down against me at Gilgal, and I have not asked the favor of the LORD.' So I forced myself and offered the burnt offering." Samuel's reply is that Saul has been rejected by the Lord as King of Israel.

The irony and tragedy of the story is that in Saul's desire to obtain God's favor, he loses God's favor. He loses far more than favor in a battle. He loses God's blessing and favor as King.

We talk about patience and waiting on the Lord. All this is easy to say until the stakes are high or pressure becomes overwhelming.

We value God's blessing. We want to do things God's way. We know that we cannot go alone into the struggle. The stress keeps building. Finally, we can stand it no longer. We can wait no longer. Somebody has to do something. We act, all in the name of the Lord, rather than wait on the Lord.

The Bible is filled with passages that call us to wait upon the Lord. Waiting is really trusting Him. God knows our need. If we have sought Him, then, we wait. If He has led us to this point, then, we wait.

I don't know what you face, but wait upon the Lord. If you are the leader of His people, don't think that everything rests on your shoulder to "make it happen." Wait on the Lord.

What I have learned is that waiting is much harder work than charging ahead. Waiting has consequences far beyond the immediate circumstances that produce stress, fear, and urgency.

"Wait for the LORD; Be strong and let your heart take courage; Yes, wait for the LORD." – Psalm 27:14
