## Construction Plans For Apalina Church Get Green Light

Good News from Apalina! The government paperwork required for the Apalina church is almost complete. Everything is moving along and by the end of June the permit to begin construction should be in Attila Toth's hand.

Teleios partners have already given the funds necessary for the laying of the foundation. However, an important decision remains after the foundation is completed. Does the Apalina church wait until next year to finish constructing the church or do they begin this year?

This decision also involves partnership opportunities. The estimated finish cost on the construction is \$50,000, but volunteer work can reduce this amount over 50 percent. Your partnership in prayer is needed.

*45 Sponsorships Desperately Needed For This Year's Gypsy Camps*

Gypsy Summer Camp is literally around the corner, and we find that we are short on sponsorships for the children.

Because of construction and renovation work at the camp, we were assigned camp dates in June. The first session is scheduled to begin June 14. The second session will follow the next week. There will be 45 children per camp.

We are stepping out in faith to hold a second camp again this year. We have been blessed with so many opportunities this year, that, unfortunately, we have not been promoting Gypsy Summer Camp as enthusiastically over the last month, and time has slipped up on us!

Camp costs, including food, transportation, teaching and craft supplies,



have increased slightly so a sponsorship is \$50.00 per child.

At press time, we are short on sponsorships for the children but are continuing to plan, praying for a miracle.

Pray with us that funds will become available so all the children might be able to participate in summer camp this year.

June 14 is fast on its way, and we are reaching out for help. If you feel led to give, please do so. If you know of others who would like to provide assistance to send a child to camp, please share this story with them.

# Growing On Faith In Partnership To Help Change Lives

For the past three years, Attila Toth has taken the children of the Apalina Roma (Gypsy) Mission to summer camp. A Romanian pastor's wife, Mimi, and her husband, Cornel Barlea, generously offered the use of their property near Sebesu the Sus, Romania, for the camp without charge.

The first two years, about 45 children per year came to camp. Last year, with the addition of another week, more than 95 children enjoyed a full week of camp!

The couple had a dream of enlarging the buildings on the property for marriage enrichment retreats, as well as providing better space for the camps. Bonnie and I first met the couple in Sibiu in October 2009. They shared their dream, and we agreed to partner with them. The type of improvements they discussed would provide a quality camp environment for the Gypsy children for years to come at little or no cost. Attila also sees the realization of a dream—a marriage enrichment retreat for Gypsy couples.

In March 2010, I had the privilege of meeting with Attila, his wife Adel, Mimi, Cornel, and Zoltan Dohi. Zoltan is another church planter who partnered with Attila in working with the Gypsy people in the area. We met to go over the drawings and plans for the project. A true partnership was born.

Attila and Zoltan would get volunteer help from the Gypsy missions and churches in the area. Mimi and Cornel would provide materials. Teleios Ministry would partner to provide skilled labor for the project. An immediate challenge would be the timeframe—the project needed to be completed in two and a half months before camp began.

Each of us left with our own set of concerns about the project,

but we all left committed that this partnership would glorify God.

Once spring arrived and work could begin, the original contractor broke his leg just before construction was to start. God provided another contractor, a man who actually came from Attila's area—he had been a part of the mission work at the beginning.

So many things have happened that should have hindered the work, but the great news is the Gypsy men of Apalina and other villages have given their time and energy to help with construction. Every time something would happen, God used it to His glory. The way the Gypsies have volunteered and worked very hard on the project has been a great testimony to others.

Attila has been spending every week on site leading the team. Zoltan has been working, too. They make the five-hour drive each Monday and return to Apalina each Friday to prepare for the Sunday services.

With less than one month to go, you can see from the photo above that there is still a lot of work.

Please continue to pray for the work to be completed as the first group of almost 60 campers and leaders arrive on June 14.

Also, Teleios Ministry is seeking a partner to help offset the skilled labor costs. The total cost is \$7,000. Please pray that God will be the center of the camp, the partnership, and the work.

# Your Commitment Can Change A Child's World

Last December, the Daily Bread Life Children's Home incorporated the Asante Sana Children's Home into its operations.

This children's home is designed to provide care for 28 orphans ranging in age from infant to seven years. There are currently 17 children being cared for. It was built by an Italian non-government organization (NGO) in the village of Nzihi because of the high number of HIV-positive adults in the area.

The NGO is providing financial support through December of this year. After that date, DBLCH will be responsible for all operational expenses.

The need for partners to assist in the financial support of this children's home is great, but the investment can literally change

a child's world and give him or her a future that may never have been available.

There is an extensive farm on site that will help generate revenue for operations once it and other efforts are fully developed. Until that time, effective January 2011, \$2,500 a month will be needed to cover operational expenses for the Asante Sana Children's Home.

Please pray that God will touch the hearts of those who want to help further the dream that all children should have a home.

## Reflections From the Green Chair....

This reflection came out of a statement that a preacher made today, “Jesus came into this world to die.”

Something about that statement really hit me and drove me to the green chair. I have heard that statement before. I know what he was saying, but I realize that I disagree with that statement and find it an incomplete expression of Jesus’ purpose.

Jesus did not leave glory to die but to return. Jesus did not leave heaven to die but to live.

I went back and checked when Jesus talked about or alluded to His own death on the cross or at the hands of others. Jesus did not end with the cross or death but with life.

This in no way belittles or diminishes the impact of the cross for the redemption of the world. I see stopping Jesus’ purpose at the cross as like a prisoner being set free from prison. It is one thing to pardon him, but it is another to give him a new life to live. You open the cell, and he leaves the prison but what now. He is free, but where does he go from here.

Jesus said, “I came that you might have an overflowing life.”

Why do I bring this up? One aspect of Jesus’ dying was that He could show us how to live. Unless a seed falls to the ground and dies, it cannot bear fruit/live/accomplish its life purpose. “If anyone wants to follow me, let him/her take up their cross, and follow me...”

We were not born to die (the penalty of sin is death; the wages of sin is death). We were born to live (Read Genesis 2-3 again). “When you eat the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you will surely die.” Disobedience/sin brings death. As God created us, we were and are created to live.

We were created to live a full/whole/meaningful life. Jesus removed our sin in the cross through forgiveness. He overcame death through the obedience and trust of God to offer us life. Suffering/hardship/death are not the end of life or why we are here.

I do believe that we will all pass through the valley of shadow of death, experience suffering, as well as difficult and

trying circumstances that rock us, maybe even to death. We shall live as followers of Jesus. We were born to live. We were born again to live.

Forgiveness is just the beginning of life. We are out of prison; we are free; we have been given new life; now what? I say “Let’s live!” Let’s get on with living the new life.

Jesus has a life beyond anything we can imagine prepared for us now! An abundant life that is worth living even if it is difficult and includes suffering or pain. We die to sin, we die to self-centeredness, we die to things of this world that destroy us, and we embrace His life—a bear hug that will not let go.

Why am I reflecting on this? This life in Jesus is for living. This life in Jesus comes with a purpose, a mission greater than ourselves. This life with Jesus and in Jesus is about living—being the active visible expression of God’s redeeming purpose in this world.
