Knowing Floyd, Bonnie, and Bernard was a great help in getting to understand the various customs and the whole African (and Kenyan) context, and the bonding with Team 1 and Team 2 has been great, too.

Also, I am glad for all the work that was covered in all three series of events (Gatunguru, Koinonia, Nyeri), with all the teaching that was involved, I enjoyed it very much and I pray that the fruit will continue to be produced

I could categorize the impressions that I got during my 19 days there into three main groups: the material needs, the Spiritual atmosphere, and the exotic environment.

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God's Love Shines Through The Lives Of Three Brothers

"So let's go in and see their home"
Lucy said. We were standing in front
of a blue building with a green door
on the road to Ruaka. The home we
were visiting was that of Anthony,
Samuel and Simon.

The most amazing thing about these three is that they are 17, 14 and 10, and they live alone in this room. As I stood there looking at their room and absorbing their story, I was amazed at their maturity, humbled by their graciousness and thankful to have met them.

Their story began with each of them living on the street and each of them finding Koinonia Baptist Church.

The boys each shared their journeys (or "safaris" in Swahili) with the members of Koinonia. While the church knew that the boys' spiritual needs were important, they also

knew that basic needs had to be met first in order to show God's love to these three young men.

By God's grace, Acts Fellowship in Greenville is a partner of Koinonia Baptist Church. When Koinonia Pastor Bernard Kabaru Mwangi shared the stories of Anthony, Samuel and Simon, members of Acts knew that providing for the basic necessities of these three boys was their task.

Funds were provided to rent a place next to Pastor Sammy Mwangi's house so that he and his wife, Lucy, could provide oversight and assistance to the boys every day. Lucy has taught the boys to cook meals and to clean clothes so that they are self-sufficient. Pastor Sammy is working with the boys on staying in school and learning about God's

Continued from page 1 word. Sammy and Lucy's children, Patience, Dennis and Joy, provide laughter, toys to play with, and a greater sense of family.

As the week wore on, I watched each of the boys closely. I was curious about their personalities and their way of life. I watched as Anthony played with the smaller children and helped "corral" them when they got unruly. I watched him smile broadly as he tried to teach my mother Kikuyu. I saw his joy at being able to help and teach others, and I was convicted regarding the choice I make daily of whether to be joyful in all things.

I watched Samuel, always one step ahead of everyone around him; serving all the while. He was always there to move chairs and benches, even before we could ask. Every day, he helped serve lunch and was one of the last in line to eat. I learned that he misses his mother tremendously and feels a great responsibility to provide for his younger half-siblings who are scattered throughout Ruaka.

Simon is one of those siblings, and Samuel looks out for him more than Simon will ever know. I saw Samuel's potential in a mind incredibly gifted and a servant's heart. I was reminded of my own gifts and how I squander them.

Simon is very shy and quiet. I believe he is impacted the most by the lack of true parents. He always sat quietly watching

interaction and seemed the most in need of smiles and hugs. Simon didn't attend Bible Camp one day because he hadn't had time to wash his clothes, and he was embarrassed that his shoes were falling apart on his feet. I looked at his smiling face with the sad eyes, I looked at the shoes that kept him from camp, and I was convicted about my closet full.

On the last day of camp, I asked my friend Robert to translate as I spoke to Samuel. I had been praying for the boys all week, and I was sure I needed to talk specifically to him.

As Robert, Samuel and I sat in the small room, I talked to Samuel about the future. I shared with him my thoughts regarding the potential I saw in him. I told him that one of the things that bothers me most in life is when people have potential and they choose not to fulfill it. I told him that quitting school now to get a job would be his choosing not to fulfill his potential. I promised him that if he would stay in school and continue living with Anthony and Simon, his needs would always be provided for.

He looked at me skeptically, then intently. He sized me up, his eyes welled up with tears and he nodded. I know he will stay in school. He is a man of his word. I told him I knew he missed his mother and when his heart was empty to remember that he is in my

heart, that he is special, and that I believe he can change his world.

Before leaving Kenya, I asked Lucy if there was anything I could do for "the guys." She smiled and told me that they really needed new shoes and some new clothes. I looked at the money I had brought from home for souvenirs and gifts. I thought about my house, my closet full of shoes and my job waiting for me at home. I hope the boys are enjoying their new shoes and clothes.

In telling you their story, I tell you a story of hope...a hope for today; that all things will be provided in His time; a hope for tomorrow that these three young men will grow up to be incredible men of faith; a hope for eternity that we will praise God together in Heaven.

Please pray for Anthony, Samuel and Simon. Please pray that they will be cognizant of the love and family they provide for each other and that Lucy, Sammy and Koinonia are providing for them. Please pray that they live the lives that God has ordained for them.

Please pray that Anthony continues to find joy teaching and leading and that his smile never fades. Please pray for Samuel, that his heart will be full, his mind willing to learn and his potential fulfilled. Please pray for Simon, that he will feel loved, feel included and know that our Father loves him immensely.

In terms of material needs, I was struck by the multitude of children who eat only once a week through the benevolence work done by the Baptist church in Nyeri. The helplessness of so many innocent little children asks for compassion, and I hope and pray that more and more people will be involved in providing help in this respect.

From the point of view of the Spiritual atmosphere, it is evident that there is a great openness in the church when it comes to teaching children, youth, adults, as well as leaders, and it was encouraging to see their readiness the accept the challenges.

One of the pastors that we met in Gatunguru came to Nyeri to the Youth Conference with his youth, and he shared with me that after they went home from Gatunguru they already started implementing small group Bible study and that it works! Needless to say, it was quite an encouragement to hear about it!

The visitations of families in the slums showed us that non-believers are also open. One afternoon we visited a family whose children were attending the morning vacation Bible Camp. Their neighbors wanted us to come into their home as well, and at the end of my visit I could also pray for them!

Also, the baptismal service in the river in Ruaka was a great event and reason for great joy for all of us and for the unseen witnesses in heaven.

The exotic environment - plants and animals - was great, too, and made it easier for me to imagine how the Garden of Eden must have looked!

Praise God for His wonderful creation, and for the new creation that He performs in the lives of many Africans who accept Christ and start growing towards maturity!

Reflections From the Green Chair.....

I thank you, our Teleios Partners, for your prayers, calls, cards, and visits over the past three weeks since the death of my brother, Ted. He was 56 years old and was celebrating with his wife, Wanda, 37 years of marriage. They have three children, Keats and his wife, Corrina, Dylan, and Michelle. They have two grandchildren, Kayden and Kya. Please continue to remember all of them in your prayers.

The past few weeks have reminded me how quickly our lives can change, of how much our lives are affected by what we cannot control. Yet, we continue to live with the pretense that we do have enormous control over our lives. We live in a "bubble" of a reality that we created.

When Bonnie and I were getting off the airplane in Greenville on the Wednesday evening before Christmas, our daughter, Michal, was waiting on us. She hugged me and said, "Michelle called and something serious has happened to Uncle Ted."

Gone were our plans of parties, getting a Christmas tree, and preparing for Christmas. Never did we dream or think that we would be spending the next four days at a Brunswick, Georgia, hospital or on St. Simon's Island. We had made plans to be with Ted and Wanda on St. Simon's right after Christmas. However, we arrived a week early to a totally unexpected situation. Life is fragile and so uncertain.

During that time, too, we prayed for the elections in Kenya. We read, watched, and listened to the violence that exploded in the aftermath of the elections. This "island of stability" in East Africa suddenly spewed the molten lava of violence, riots, and murder from the tribal hatred and tensions that lay buried beneath.

Now, no one is sure what will happen next. The lives of thousands were suddenly changed—even those not living in Kenya are deeply affected. More than 1,000 killed, hundreds of thousands displaced, entire families lost, children separated from family, churches burned—life is fragile and so uncertain.

If you are still reading, you may be wondering what am I doing writing this depressing and sad. Why couldn't I write about something inspiring, encouraging, uplifting, etc. Well, I am.

Even though life is uncertain, God in Jesus never is. He is the same yesterday, today, and forever. Even though life is fragile, God in Jesus is an unbreakable rock. He alone defines reality. He alone controls. In Him and in Him alone is Life.

A song (Psalm 42) written by the sons of Korah begins: "God is our refuge and strength, A very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change And though the mountains slip into the heart of the sea..."

The song ends with "Stop moving, Calm down, be still and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations; I will exalted in the earth."

I am glad that I stopped in the green chair to reflect and regain a true perspective on the events of my life and those I love. I saw the Lord exalted.
